



Performance Highlights¹ for New York

2003-2004

EDUCATION

(18 subgrantees reporting)
 8,148 students in grades 1-12 were tutored.
 7,246 students received mentoring in school success or achievement.
 2,537 individuals benefited from service-learning and community education activities.

ENVIRONMENT

(4 subgrantees reporting)
 422 miles of trails, roadways, and other park areas were maintained or cleaned.
 875 acres of trees in wildlands or park lands were planted, benefiting 66,000 people.

HUMAN NEEDS

(8 subgrantees reporting)
 9,256 people were provided case management for health appointments or follow-up scheduling.
 5,548 participants benefited from after-school sports and violence avoidance activities.

COMMUNITY STRENGTHENING

(29 subgrantees reporting)
 21 neighborhood gardens were planted, benefiting 13,887 people.
 17,393 people benefited from neighborhood clean-up activities.

VOLUNTEER LEVERAGING

(26 subgrantees reporting)
 301 volunteers were recruited for tutoring or other educational purposes.
 2,607 volunteers were recruited for assistance in addressing human needs issues.

MEMBER DEVELOPMENT

(18 subgrantees reporting)
 304 members received training in technical skills related to carrying out their assignments.
 264 members received training in life skills.
 168 members received training in CPR, first aid, and emergency response.

EDUCATION

(25 subgrantees reporting)
 38,091 students in grades 1-12 were tutored.
 6,158 students received mentoring in school achievement.
 3,057 in-class enrichment sessions were provided, benefiting 41,853 students.

ENVIRONMENT

(6 subgrantees reporting)
 183 miles of trails, roadways, and other park areas were maintained or cleaned.
 8,352 trees were planted in wild lands or park lands.

HUMAN NEEDS

(17 subgrantees reporting)
 820 people were provided case management for health appointments or follow-up scheduling.
 13 community buildings were rehabilitated, renovated, or repaired, benefiting 107,000 people.
 275 seniors and disabled individuals received independent living assistance.

PUBLIC SAFETY

(4 subgrantees reporting)
 952 individuals received emergency assistance.
 2,403 people participated in anti-victimization counseling or counseling training, or in violence prevention workshops.

COMMUNITY STRENGTHENING

(39 subgrantees reporting)
 600 people benefited from 8 community policing or police relations programs started or continued by AmeriCorps members.
 12 neighborhood gardens were planted, benefiting 753 people.

VOLUNTEER LEVERAGING

(39 subgrantees reporting)
 5,310 volunteers were recruited for assistance in addressing human needs issues.
 1,257 volunteers were trained and placed in a variety of services.

MEMBER DEVELOPMENT

(33 subgrantees reporting)
 606 members received training in technical skills related to carrying out their assignments.
 495 members received training in life skills, such as organizational skills, problem solving, teamwork, and leadership.

Data Source: All data are aggregates of the data subgrantees report in the AmeriCorps Progress Reports. State Commissions review subgrantees' reports, and then submit approved information to AmeriCorps through the Grantee Progress Reports (GPR). AmeriCorps programs vary in their start and end dates, and not all programs operate during the same timeframe. During any given year the time period of activity reported is between October 1st through September 30th. Any program activity that may have occurred after September 30, 2005 is not captured in this report.

¹ For New York, all 2003-2004 performance highlights are based on Formula, Competitive, and Education Award subgrantee self-report (total number of subgrantees for New York in 2003-2004 was 35). For 2004-2005, all performance highlights are based on Formula, Competitive, Homeland Security, and Education Award subgrantee self-report (total number of subgrantees for New York in 2004-2005 was 47).







AmeriCorps State Members Serving in New York Counties: 2004-05





¹ For education award usage rates, we examined awards in which members have had three or more years to access the award. This decision was based on evidence that most members use the education award within three years of earning it.

For this report, we have identified members who served in 1994-1995 through 2001-2002 to examine usage rates for education awards.

1994-1995 through 1997-1998: Members who served in 1994-1995 through 1997-1998 have completed their seven-year education award eligibility period; because the eligibility period for using the education award is completed, we have aggregated the usage rate for these members.

1998-1999 through 2001-2002: Members who served in 1998-1999 through 2001-2002 have at least one year of eligibility left. As former members of these years access their education awards, these data will fluctuate as the awards remain active.

We will continue to track AmeriCorps member education award usage by year, adding an additional year in the "eligibility remaining" portion of the graph. Usage rates may differ from year to year as more earned education award money is withdrawn from members' Trust accounts. As members end their seven-year period of eligibility they will be added to the "eligibility completed" group.
