



Performance Highlights¹ for South Carolina

2003-2004

EDUCATION

(5 subgrantees reporting)
 702 students in grades 1-12 received tutoring.
 215 students received mentoring toward school success and achievement.
 48 students participated in service-learning or community education activities.

HOMELAND SECURITY

(1 subgrantee reporting)
 18 community policing programs were started or continued, benefiting 1,051 people.
 408 people participated in anti-victimization counseling or counseling training, or in violence prevention workshops.
 2,573 people received emergency assistance.

HUMAN NEEDS

(1 subgrantee reporting)
 130 low-income housing units were constructed for 480 elderly or disabled residents.

VOLUNTEER LEVERAGING

(6 subgrantees reporting)
 2,314 people volunteered for organized service days for the community.
 8,976 people received volunteer training, support, and/or recognition.
 125 volunteers were recruited to provide tutoring or other educational assistance.

MEMBER DEVELOPMENT

(5 subgrantees reporting)
 44 members were trained in citizenship and civic responsibility.
 34 members were trained in life skills, such as organizational skills, problem solving, teamwork, and leadership skills.
 30 members were trained in CPR, first aid, and emergency response.

EDUCATION

(6 subgrantees reporting)
 2,804 students in grades 1-12 received tutoring.

HUMAN NEEDS

(1 subgrantee reporting)
 216 low-income housing units for elderly or disabled residents were constructed, benefiting 858 people.

COMMUNITY STRENGTHENING

(6 subgrantees reporting)
 800 people benefited from community events or fairs focusing on health or other human needs issues.

VOLUNTEER LEVERAGING

(6 subgrantees reporting)
 1,528 volunteers were recruited to provide a range of services addressing human needs issues.

MEMBER DEVELOPMENT

(3 subgrantees reporting)
 91 members were trained in citizenship and civic responsibility.
 184 members were trained in life skills, such as organizational skills, problem solving, teamwork, and leadership skills.
 14 members were trained in CPR, first aid, and emergency response.

Data Source: All data are aggregates of the data subgrantees report in the AmeriCorps Progress Reports. State Commissions review subgrantees' reports, and then submit approved information to AmeriCorps through the Grantee Progress Reports (GPR). AmeriCorps programs vary in their start and end dates, and not all programs operate during the same timeframe. During any given year the time period of activity reported is between October 1st through September 30th. Any program activity that may have occurred after September 30, 2005 is not captured in this report.

¹ For South Carolina, all 2003-2004 performance highlights are based on Formula, Competitive, and Homeland Security Award subgrantee self-report (total number of subgrantees for South Carolina in 2003-2004 was 8). For 2004-2005, all performance highlights are based on Formula and Competitive Award subgrantee self-report (total number of subgrantees for South Carolina in 2004-2005 was 8).







AmeriCorps State Members Serving in South Carolina Counties: 2004-05





¹ For education award usage rates, we examined awards in which members have had three or more years to access the award. This decision was based on evidence that most members use the education award within three years of earning it.

For this report, we have identified members who served in 1994-1995 through 2001-2002 to examine usage rates for education awards.

1994-1995 through 1997-1998: Members who served in 1994-1995 through 1997-1998 have completed their seven-year education award eligibility period; because the eligibility period for using the education award is completed, we have aggregated the usage rate for these members.

1998-1999 through 2001-2002: Members who served in 1998-1999 through 2001-2002 have at least one year of eligibility left. As former members of these years access their education awards, these data will fluctuate as the awards remain active.

We will continue to track AmeriCorps member education award usage by year, adding an additional year in the “eligibility remaining” portion of the graph. Usage rates may differ from year to year as more earned education award money is withdrawn from members’ Trust accounts. As members end their seven-year period of eligibility they will be added to the “eligibility completed” group.
