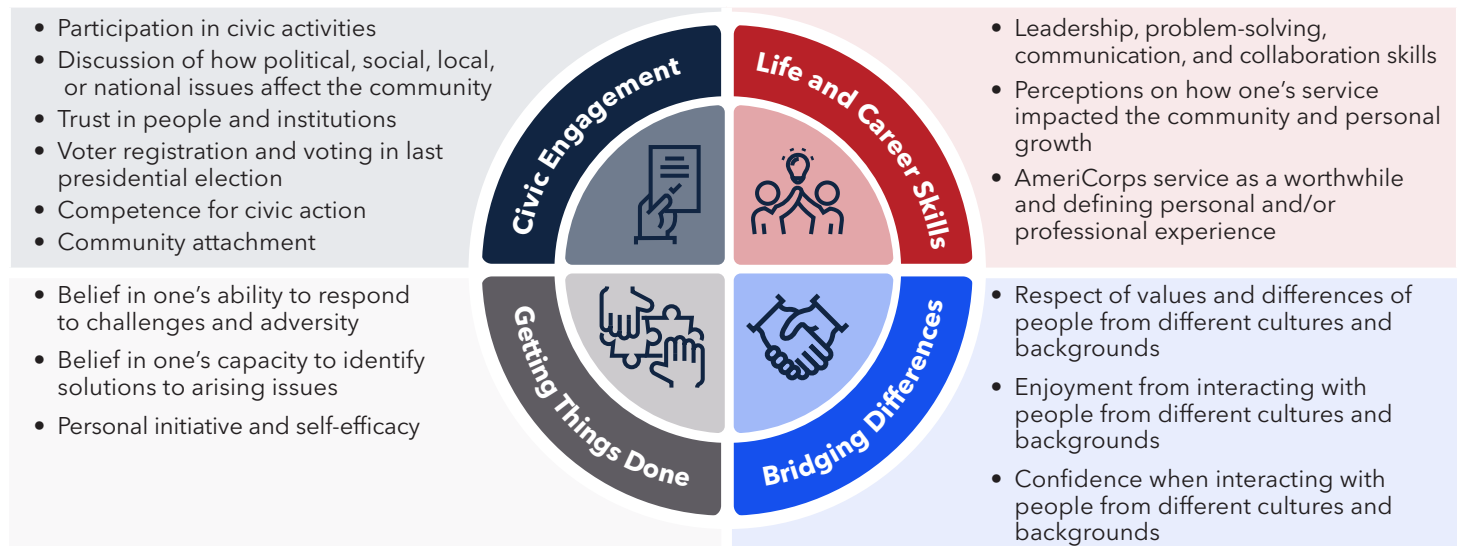


## AmeriCorps Member Exit Survey

The AmeriCorps Member Exit Survey (MES) captures AmeriCorps members' insights about their service experience and attitudes upon exiting their programs. Over 350,000 members across the three AmeriCorps service streams (AmeriCorps State and National, AmeriCorps VISTA, and AmeriCorps NCCC) have completed the MES since April 2015.

108 total questions comprise the MES and fall into four "pathways" (areas of member development towards becoming empowered and prepared citizens) and five "domains" (other topics of interest that do not fall into one of four pathways) that articulate AmeriCorps' theory of change for its members.

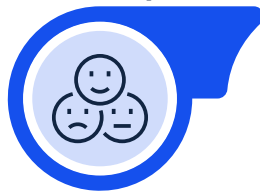
### Domains

- Satisfaction with AmeriCorps service
- Recommendation of AmeriCorps service to family or friends

- Reason for joining AmeriCorps

#### Post-Service Plans



- Plans for using AmeriCorps education award
- Education, workforce, and service plans after AmeriCorps
- Plans for listing AmeriCorps experience on resume

#### Training



- Adequacy of training, resources, supervision, and supports
- Training on how to describe AmeriCorps experience
